September Events


There will be three events in September: the Miner's Day Parade, a run to Antelope Island, and the Mount Nebo Loop run.

Miner's Day Parade. The Miner's Day Parade is *September 1 i*n Park City. Floyd and Kathy Inman will be organizing this. This will be a traditional parade down Main Street in Park City with a picnic following it. The BMCU has taken part in this parade for the past several years and everyone seems to like it. The editors have never made it to this parade since we always are in Steamboat Springs, but is appears to be a great one. Park City parades work out well since they are downhill and it is normally cool there in the morning. Meet on upper Main Street or on Swede Alley near Main at 9:30 AM, September 1, in Park City. Antelope Island. The second event will be a run to Antelope Island. We tried this a year ago in the Spring and it poured rain on us. Hopefully this year will be dry. There will be two meeting places. In Salt Lake we will meet at the *Utah Travel* Council parking lot at 9:00 AM on Saturday, September 13. The Travel Council parking lot can be reached by heading North up State Street until you are forced to turn by the capital building. Turn right, and then right again into the first parking lot you see. Joe Martinez has a route worked out for us near the lake. If you are coming from the North, you can meet us at Antelope Island toll booth at about 10:00 (be patient). Since travel times are very confused by the road construction, we may be late arriving at the toll booth. Bring a book, or rebuild your

carburators, or something. We will tour the island and picnic at one of the sites on the island. The island is a State Park and there is a fee to enter it and use the causeway. For more information contact Joe at 255-8326.

Mt. Nebo. At the end of the month we will do a run over the Mount Nebo Loop to check out the fall colors. We will meet at River Pointe Plaza, 9000 South Redwood Rd. (1700 West) at 8:30 AM on Saturday September 27. This is an early start but we need it to do the 200 or so miles on this trip. If you prefer you can drive down to Nehi and stay in the Whitmore Mansion Bed and Breakfast (623-2047 for reservations) or in a motel in Nehi. If you do this make sure you contact the trip leaders, Dan and Sharon Forester at 966-6463, before going, so the group meets you in Nehi. Bring a picnic lunch or buy lunch before you get on the loop road. There are no stores or restaurants on the mountain. Come prepared for cool weather and check out the forecast carefully. We have had snow, rain and fog during this trip in the past, but the fall colors are definitely worth it.. In any weather it is a beautiful drive. For other information contact Sharon and Dan.

The Alpine Loop

The Alpine Loop was a microcosm of driving in Utah in 1997: road construction, fees, and too much traffic. Saturday, August 2, was a grand day, sunny and a bit hot, but no chance of rain. When we arrived the group was small but it grew and after we picked up the folks in Alpine/Highland, we had 34 cars on the road, making it one of the larger Alpine Loop groups. As we discussed the route, we learned several things: everyone believed that the ruts on the I-15 frontage road that caused an accident a few weeks ago had be repaired, the Alpine Store had disappeared and was being replaced by a gas station-mega convenience store, a fee was being collected if you stop in American Fork Canyon or on the Loop road, but not if you were just "passing through," and Provo Canyon hadn't had a land slide for a while, but still had only one lane open. All of this, plus the usual warning about the narrow, twisty Loop road all came up in the meeting.

Traffic was bad on State Street and we were well spread out before the turn onto the Frontage Road. We never saw the ruts and all made our way to the new gas station/convenience store without incident. As we arrived it wasn't clear if it was open, but people were flowing across the street in large numbers under the assumption that it was. Luckily it was, but the gas pumps hadn't been installed. Several of us watched the pump plumbing being pressure tested, while others make a pit stop. The line of cars extended from the corner well up into the houses to the East. Heading off into American Fork Canyon we found the toll booth and Bruce, leading the gaggle, explained to the toll collector what was going on and who then

came out and waved us all though. The canyon seemed cool and we didn't notice any overheating problems. The road is always beautiful and seemed particularly attractive this weekend. We stopped to regroup just before Provo Canyon and several people noticed some very hot brakes, both by odor and by the smoke coming off them. Clearly lower gears should be used during the desent. The one lane section of road in Provo Canyon was about one quarter of a mile above the point where the Loop road enters Provo Canyon, and traffic would back up across the intersection, making it difficult to make the Edwin Barker, John & Liz Green, Arthur turn. Eventually we all got out and cruised up to Heber.

Denise and Barry Blackett had done an excellent job of obtaining donated items for the raffle. These ranged from key fobs to car covers to posters to \$25. gift certificates. The lunch time raffle raised \$208. This will pay for the newsletter for the next three or more months. The raffle again proved a basic idea about statistics, if you buy a lot of tickets you will win more prizes.

After the raffle, about half the group opted for a short route home and left the main group. The rest of us took the longer route through Francis, Kamas, Oakley and Peoa. We had to drop Park City from the route this year since the Arts Festival was going on and we didn't want to try to even get

near to it. It was good to see some faces and cars we hadn't seen for a while, but we wish we had a few more of the original group take part. Even so, the Tenth Alpine Loop was rousing success. I wonder what the twentieth, will be like?






