A Note From the Exchequer



Hint for the month: Are all "Phillips" screws created equal? No, there are true Phillips screws and at least two other types that resemble Phillips screws. What appears to be "Phillips" screws in many trim-type application on our cars are really Pozidriv screws. Does this make any difference other than to the manufacturer? Yes, a Phillips screwdriver does not fit Pozidriv screws properly. The walls in the screwdriver tip for Pozidriv screws are not as tapered as on a true Phillips screw and have wedges for a tight fit. If you try to use a Phillips screwdriver on a very tight Pozidriv screw it will slip in the slots making the screw harder than ever to remove. These Pozidriv screws can be identified by four lines on the head radiating out from the center, between the slots. You can obtain Pozidriv screwdrivers from tool suppliers Having the right tool can save a great deal of frustration.
