If you're Irish...


...you want to be part the annual St.

See You Guys!

While this esteemed publication does not usually include such things as recipes and household hints, the number of comments about the ginger-garlic chicken at the February pot-luck warrants printing the recipe. So, what follows is a close approximation of "See You Guys" chicken. The actual Chinese name of the dish is something I've long since forgotten, but it sounds like "see you guys."

2 pounds chicken legs or wings

2 cloves garlic,

2 thumb sized pieces fresh ginger

1 cup soy sauce

1/4 cup sherry

1/4 cup rice vinegar

Peel and finely chop the garlic and ginger. More timid palates may want to lower the garlic and ginger content. Arrange the chicken pieces in a glass baking dish. Sprinkle the garlic and ginger over the chicken. Mix the liquid ingredients together, pour over the chicken. Cover with plastic wrap and marinate for an hour or two, turning the pieces over once. Bake in a 425 degree oven for about 40 minutes, turning the pieces over halfway through the baking. Enjoy!

With springtime rapidly approaching, and summer not too far off, it's time to make some plans for the season. As usual, the Utah region SCCA will have a series of autocross events scheduled throughout the summer. The first one will be Sunday, April 6th. Autocross is a low speed, precision driving event, where one driver at a time runs through a course marked out by pylons in a large parking lot. Those of you who have attended the club's British Field Day events in the past have likely seen a small version of this. For this year's Field Day, Team Fat should have the Killer Spit on hand. Autocross, or Solo II, as the SCCA calls it, can be undertaken by any car that basically won't fall apart on course, and is equipped with seat belts. Give it a try, it is pretty fun. A more serious, higher speed event is a hillclimb. Again, one driver at a time, against the clock, on a section of public highway blocked off for the event. Due to the nature of the event, safety requirements for the cars and drivers are more stringent. Wiping out a cone or two in a parking lot won't hurt anything, but flying off a highway at speed can be more detrimental to one's skin, both human and sheet metal. Intermountain Vintage Racing will hold two hillclimbs again this year. The first is scheduled for June 7th and 8th, on the road leading to Snow Basin, east of Ogden. The second one is slated for Bear Hollow, outside of Park City, on September 20/21. Again, if interested in these events, call Mark at 573-7246.
